
Method Seattle PHOTO REANIZING Checklist



This checklist includes my both my 4-step process for organizing your photos and recommended resources for digitizing, backing up and preventing future photo clutter!

most of the 'sentimental' things you have kept that take

up so much room in your home.

The Checklist

If you grew up on the 60's, 70's, 80's or 90's your photos and video collections probably include everything from VHS tapes to print pictures to slides and even film reels. It can be overwhelming, especially when you add in the photos you've inherited from your parents and grandparents! Here's how to corral all of those memories into a collection that is accesible and safely backed up

- ✓ Gather
- ✓ Edit
- ✓ Digitize
- ✓ Backup

No matter how many photos you have or how many places they are currently live, the process for getting the overwhelm under control includes these 4 steps





The first thing you need to do is get all of your physical photos and videos into one room/space. This may be a fairly easy step if you've been stashing them in one place all along. But many folks have pictures scattered in many areas of their home. Go through your closets, garage and storage spaces. I recommend including any pictures in frames that you come across that aren't currently on display in the house. Bring anything you find to your Home Base. Be prepared to feel overwhelmed at this point as you note the sheer volume of photos. Take a deep breath, this project will be worth it, I promise!



Now it's time to edit down. You don't need or want to keep everything! Select a portion of your pile of pictures. It could be one box, one bag, one album or one handful. Start small, it's okay. Go through the pile and remove any pictures that fit the following criteria: low quality, duplicates and near-duplicates, people you don't know, no people.

If you have so many photos that even the above process feels too hard I recommend visually scanning through each album/stack/box and picking 5-10 photos to keep. Sometimes it's faster and less intimidating to turn the process inside-out!

Editing these pics out now will save you either time or money later so be ruthless. I promise when you are done you will not remember or regret the editing decisions you are making now. The edits can go in the trash, your hopefully much-smaller pile can be set aside in one of your boxes or bins. You can also *ditch the negatives*, no need to keep them as you will get just-as-high quality by scanning the photo itself.



Once you've edited down to a much smaller pile of print photos it's time to digitize them, as well as all of the legacy media sitting around in your home.

Digitizing your prints and legacy media has 3 benefits. You can more easily consume it AND you can back it up to a cloud service so it's safe and preserved for future generations. The third benefit is that it will no longer be taking up space in your home, collecting dust.

To digitize your photos you can scan them yourself or send them to a company who digitizes. For the rest of the media, you likely need the digitizing company unless you are a supersmarty with the right equipment (in which case it is unlikely you need this checklist!) On the next page are a couple of resources I recommend...

Scanning

If you have a large amount of prints to scan, consider investing in a photo scanner. You can of course scan photos with any scanner, uncluding an app on your phone, but it takes a *lot* of time to go one by one.



This photo scanner is the best on the market. It makes quick work of a large photo scanning project and improves photo quality at the same time. I use this scanner in my photo organizing business and am consistently impressed with its speed and quality. It also doesn't take up much space and isn't cumbersome to move around. If you want to scan your own photos, this is the tool you want!

Outsourcing

If you would rather not deal with scanning your own photos, Legacybox can do it for you, as well as digitize your tapes, slides and film reels. The process is simple and the prices are reasonable, driven by how many pieces of media you have to digitize.

I've used <u>LegacyBox</u> to digitize my own media and that of hundreds of clients. They make it so easy, you barely have to lift a finger. If you are worried about sending your media away, all I can do is tell you I've never had anything go missing with my own memories or any of my clients.

It does take some time unless you choose to expedite, so if you plan accordingly you can have something really special to share at the next family gathering or holiday!



Once you've digitized your old media it's important to back it up, along with your already-digital photos so it is all secure and accessible.

There are so many cloud services that can store your newly-digitized library. You may already use a cloud service for your digital photos, in that case you can stay consistent by backing up your newly-digitized files to that same platform.

But if you don't have a cloud service or are unhappy with the one you are currently using I've included a handy chart that compares most of the big players on the next page.

Where to Back Up

There are so many choices in cloud-land and these companies are all reputable. If you already use one of them it may be easier to add your newly-digitized files to the existing library. But if you are looking for a cloud service I do have one I recommend.


